Litter pick 2018

On Saturday 24th March 2018, the Town Council held it's annual Litter pick in three locations in Didcot; Ladygrove, the Cockcroft area and around the Civic Hall.

We had a huge turn-out from residents and families eager to help clean up their neighbourhoods, to members of the Cadets and The Didcot Rugby Club. In total we had roughly 70 volunteers!

The day started with a lovely sweet treat of doughnuts, supplied by Tesco, Didcot and then the hard work began!

Sale of Didcot Signs

After the replacement of the 'Welcome to Didcot' and 'Twinned with Meylan' signs around Didcot, the old signs were given to the Mayor, Jackie Billington, to auction off in aid of her Mayor's Charities.

There were 7 sets (one 'Welcome' and one 'Twinned' sign as a set) available.

There was an incredible amount of interest and an extremely positive response from the whole town in owning a small (but heavy!) piece of Didcot history, and the final total raised for all 7 of the sets of signs was just over £1750, split between Crohn's and Colitis UK (Oxfordshire branch) and Didcot Air Cadets.




Mayor's Ball 2018

Word from the allotments

The Town Council provides over 400 allotments across five sites in the town. In what will be a regular feature, we have asked allotment holders to share what is happening on the allotments. Contributing to this edition we have:

BROADWAY ALLOTMENTS

Broadway is a family-friendly, open allotment site with over 80 plots in the centre of town, next to the Civic Hall.







Many recent newcomers to the site come from the new estates at the eastern end of town. They have shared with us new gardening ideas and plants – often from other parts of the world. Recent examples have been globe artichokes from Italy, climbing 'French' beans from Madeira, Achocha from the Andes (pictured top right) via Nepal and chickpeas from Syria.

In 2016 we celebrated its centenary with a party on the site. Each year since then we host Didcot Allotment Society's open event where you can meet allotment holders from all five of Didcot's allotment sites and have a guided tour of the site (see www.didcotallotmentsociety.com for details of this year's event and the society's AGM which is open to all).

DAS is working with the Council to ensure that plots on offer meet your needs bearing in mind the time that you have available for enjoying your allotment.

Missed Collection

Your food waste and recycling/rubbish are now being collected by different vehicles. This means that your collections are being carried out at different times of the day. For example, your recycling/rubbish bin may be emptied in the morning from 7am, while your food waste may be collected later in the day any time up until 6pm.

These changes are being made following the introduction of a new vehicle fleet, which will help us to improve collection services. Please ensure your bins are left out from 7am until 6pm and do not report a missed collection unless they have not been emptied by this time.
